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About Us

HISTORY OF CURLING IN AUSTRALIA

The first curling club in Australia formed in 1933 in Melbourne. Sir Norman Brooks – Wimbledon winner in 1907 and 1914, AFL footballer and Australian Golf Open winner – was the first President. The club was subsequently disbanded in 1939. In 1984, curling reappeared in Australia and the Australian Curling Association formed international links with the International Curling Federation (now the World Curling Federation) in 1986.

In 1990, Australia first competed internationally in Oslo, Norway. The Australian Curling Federation (ACF) was formed in 1993 to be the national governing body for the sport in Australia. James Oastler was the inaugural president of the Federation which had three state members: New South Wales, South Australia and Victoria.

The initial challenge for the ACF was to host the third Pacific Curling Championships in 1993 for which reconditioned stones were obtained on lease from the World Curling Federation. Competitors from New Zealand, Japan and Australia included men's and women's teams from all three countries. Since that time the South Australian member association has closed and two new member associations joined; the Queensland Curling Association was formed in 2005 and Curling WA was formed in 2014.

Today the ACF continues with its initial goal of supporting the state members and liaising with international bodies in an effort to propel the sport towards gaining national and international recognition.

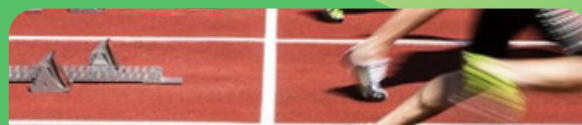

President's Report

Dear Members,

Active curling paused for much of the world this year due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Regular curling was able to continue periodically in Western Australia and Queensland with certain protocols and procedures in place, but hosting our regular championship events in Naseby was not possible. Even so, our quest for an Olympic berth continued and the World Curling Federation family grew from 64 countries to 67.

The ACF executive membership changed slightly this year. Kim Forge served as President, Laurie Weeden Vice-President, Steve Johns (NSW) and Elliott Douglas (WA), Michelle Zintschenko (Vic) and Dave Thomas (Qld) were state representatives. Robert Gagnon retired from the role of treasurer and Edwin Wan has filled his vacancy. Lyn Gill is the secretary.

Curling is played in three states, Queensland, Victoria and Western Australia. We continued to work on our strategic plan and high-performance planning during these unprecedented times. In early May 2021, Kim Forge attended the AOC AGM virtually. This year's DAP committee used a substantial portion of the allocated \$12000 US going to all three active curling states.

Many pitches for facilities have been made to government bodies and potential investors in Victoria, South Australia, Canberra and Western Australia. We continue to grow our digital audience by creating regular branded content on Facebook and Instagram (account created in Oct 2021). Communication messages have been improved through Facebook often linking members back to the website for documents and further information. Our website "look and "feel" has improved dramatically and the time spent on this by Laurie Weeden needs to be commended.

The ACF took time this year to acknowledge the trailblazers in Curling and early contributors as part of International Women's Day in March 2021 and International Men's Day in November 2021 as well as National Volunteer week in May. Curling would not be what it is today without many of these people and teams mentioned.



President's Report

January – Carlee Millikin begins her scholarship for Post Graduate Certificate “International Sport’s Management.

May – 13th Place finish for Australia (Team Gill/Hewitt) at 2021 World Mixed Doubles Championship in Scotland with a 3W-6L record.

September – World Curling Federation Virtual Congress attended by Kim Forge and John Anderson

November 2021 – Disappointingly, Australia was unable to compete in the final Pacific-Asia Curling Championships due to COVID-19 travel restrictions. A new Championship will start in 2022 called the Pan-Continental Curling Championships. This marks the end of an era really and beginning of a new chapter. We would like to acknowledge the long-time contributions of Hugh Millikin who has competed in 24 of these Championships beginning in 1991, with 9 Gold medals and 200 games – a remarkable feat!

December –Australia qualifies for Beijing 2021 Olympic Winter Games in the Mixed Doubles discipline at the World Olympic Qualification Event in the Netherlands. Team Gill/Hewitt went undefeated (7-0) in the event. This is the most significant achievement for curling in Australia to date.

I would like to thank Tahli Gill and Dean Hewitt for the commitment and dedication to their training and preparation in lead up to the qualification event. The sacrifices are too many to mention, especially considering this was done during a pandemic physically distanced from many of their support systems. Qualifying for the Olympics has brought an unprecedented interest in our sport in Australia. Achieving this historic milestone will forever change curling in our country.

Special thank you to Laurie Weeden who continues to build on areas of governance and policy creation documented on our website. Thank you to the State Representatives and members of the ACF Executive for their efforts throughout the year. Collaboration is key and your contributions are very much appreciated.

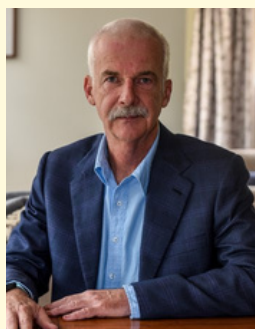

At the conclusion of 2021, all the teams have been decided for the upcoming Winter Olympic Games in Beijing February 2022. A successful Olympic Qualification event in Netherlands was the last opportunity for Women, Men and Mixed Doubles to qualify. Covid has made for a challenging qualification process as we delayed cancelled and adjusted various events. The 2022 Winter Olympic Games in Beijing will be a different experience with the tight Covid-19 protocols expected. The addition of the Australian Mixed Doubles team validates the MD as an excellent discipline for all WCF members to get the opportunity to qualify for the OWG.

Besides the WWCC and WMCC, we also managed to get in the Europeans, Americas Challenge and the final PACC in Kazakhstan, another great event hosted by Victor Kim. Australia did not field any teams which was a shame as Australia had such a long history in the event.

The PACC will be replaced by the Pan-Continental Championships in 2022. The Australian Women will be in the A group and the Australian Men in the B group. The top 5 teams will advance to the 2023 World Championships. This event will have significant coverage as Canada and the USA will be competing against the best teams from the PACC.

Treasurer's Report

Dear Members,

The current status of the bank accounts has been circulated to all members in this Financial Report. As with the past few years, this financial year follows the calendar year running from 1st January 2021 to 31st December 2021. The activities on all bank accounts are shown in the profit & loss statement and balance sheet of this Financial Report. On 31 December 2021 we had no outstanding debtors.

For outstanding income, the AOC has contributed 90% (\$38,700) of the planned \$43,000 that was earmarked for the Australian Mixed Doubles team's high performance support. The remaining 10% (\$4,300) was received in 2022 and will be reported on in the 2022 Financial Report.

Income over the course of 2021 consisted of insurance payments from the state associations, World Curling Federation's (WCF) Development and Assistance Programme (DAP) funds, Australian Olympic Committee's (AOC) high performance funding, donation from BMD Group, and bank interest.

Expenses related to WCF DAP funds distributed to the state associations, AOC high performance funding to the Australian Mixed Doubles Curling team, WCF annual membership dues, Consumer Affairs Victoria annual registration fees, printing of brochures for Wheelchair Curling, annual insurance renewal fees, bank fees & a general admin expense. It was a typical year for the ACF. We end the year with a loss of \$625.79, retaining a total of \$6,769.29 in our bank account. This is due in part because State membership dues, in the amount of \$800 total, were invoiced in 2022 not 2021 to assist states with potential cashflow challenges associated with Covid-19.

I would like to thank Kim Forge & Laurie Weeden for their guidance, assistance & advice throughout my first year as Treasurer of the ACF, to the preceding ACF Treasurer Rob Gagnon for assisting me with the transition of the role, and to the ACF Executive Committee for giving me this opportunity to contribute to the administration of our sport in Australia.

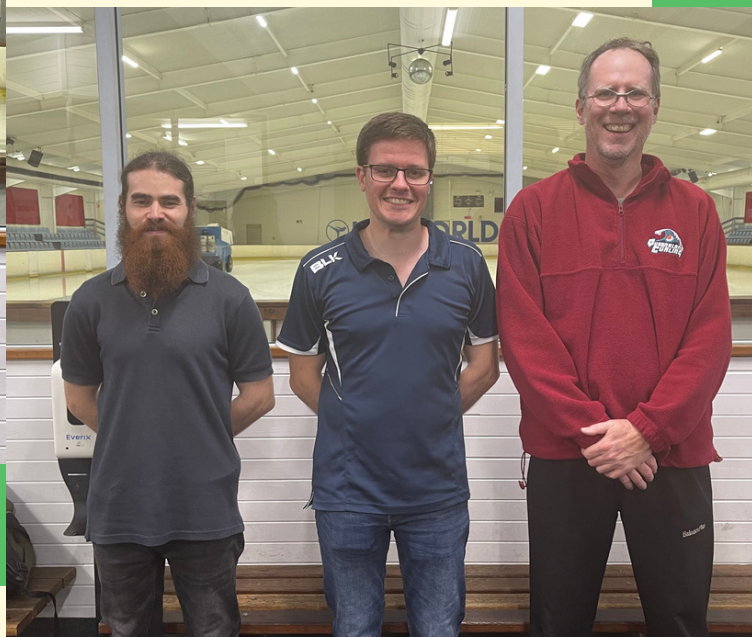

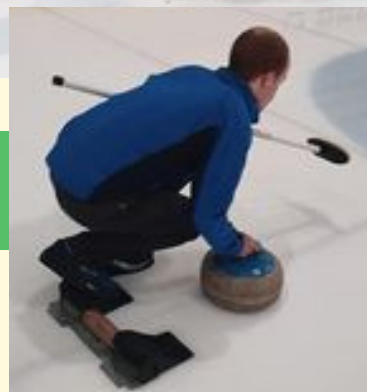

- Some social curling resumed late 2021 once restrictions eased - attendance was low



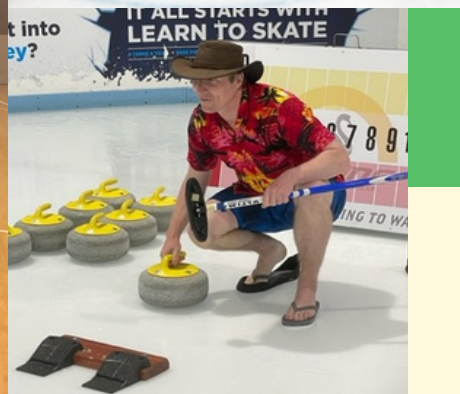

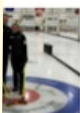

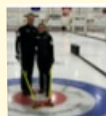
17 - 23 May 2021 - World Mixed Doubles Curling Championship Results - Aberdeen, Scotland

We acknowledge the most qualified coach in Australia, Lyn Gill, who holds a World Curling Federation Level 2 Coaching certificate. Lyn's completed two intense overseas coaching programs with the WCF and assisted with coaching two elite Junior World Curling training camps in Germany. As the long-time coach of the National Junior Women's team since 2008, Lyn has coached the team at both International and World level events since 2009. Nationally, Lyn was recognised as 2009 Coach of the Year by the Australian Institute of Winter Ice Sports for her involvement as a coach of elite Junior curling athletes. In addition, Lyn is an elite player representing Australia at the 2013 World Mixed Doubles Curling Championships and 7 Pacific-Asia Curling Championships – the most recent in 2018 with two of her daughters on the team. Individual recognition today goes to Kim Forge who, for the past 8 years, has been at the helm of the Australian Curling Federation as the first female President. Prior to this, Kim served as the ACF Vice-President for 3 years and a VCA representative before the VP role. During Kim's time as President, the number of curlers in Australia has increased by 84%. In November 2020, Kim was selected as the sole Australian for the International Olympic Committee Executive Masters in Sport Organisation Management Programme. As a long-time Curling advocate, Kim was elected by fellow athletes in 2016 to serve on the WCF Athlete Commission and is the WCF Female Representative for the ACF. From 2009 – 2014 Kim served on the Pacific-Asia Zonal Commission representing Australian interests in the region. Celebrating 2021 International Men's Day – 19th November

Jim OASTLER – First ACF President
In celebration of International Men's Day on 19th November, we dig into the archives to acknowledge the tremendous contributions of Jim Oastler. Jim began as the President of the Australian Curling Association in Victoria from 1989 to 1994. During this time, the Australian Men's team played in their first international challenge (Oslo, Norway) in 1990 where Jim was team manager/media officer. It was around this time the ACA became the Australian Curling Federation with Jim at the helm.

In these early days Jim was instrumental in liaising with Pacific region countries to have the World Curling Federation (WCF) recognise the Pacific zone to include Asia, Oceania, & Africa which ultimately created the Pacific Curling Federation where Jim served as VP of the PCF. Jim represented the PCF and ACF at WCF meetings numerous times (too countless to list!).

At the 1992 Olympic Winter Games in Albertville, when the Australian Men's team competed in the demonstration sport, Jim also represented Australia as team manager and media rep. The 1993 Pacific Curling Championships were hosted in Adelaide and Jim coordinated the ABC TV production of this event.

With 8 other countries, Jim also represented Australia as team manager and media rep. The 1993 Pacific Curling Championships were hosted in Adelaide and Jim coordinated the ABC TV production of this event. Wheelchair curling began as a discipline in Australia in 1994 and Jim, being on the WCF Program and Services Committee, co-wrote a proposal for Wheelchair Curling to be established. This turned out to be just the beginning of Jim's involvement in spearheading Wheelchair curling with the discipline being tested in 2000 within Europe and official acceptance at the International Bon Spiel and workshop held in Switzerland that year. The WCF held the first World Wheelchair Curling Championships in 2001 with 9 countries, and Jim finally saw the inclusion of Wheelchair Curling at the 2006 Paralympics Winter Games.

In 2015, Jim stepped away from curling to pursue personal interests in making documentaries (he's doing this!!), however his incredible legacy of involvement within Australian and International Curling, his extensive media knowledge, connections, perseverance and commitment to Wheelchair Curling, as well as advocating for the inclusion of Wheelchair Curling, will be remembered.

Celebrating 2021 International Men's Day – 19th November

As part of International Men's Day on the 19th November, it is important to understand Australian Curling Federation became recognised as a National Sporting Organisation (NSO) for Curling. Dave Thomas (pictured) was instrumental in finalising the first version of the Member Protection Policy (MPP) which was submitted with a suite of documents to the Australian Sports Commission.

There are many factors involved in this recognition process – some were implemented in the early days, at that time, had the foresight to create the Australian Curling Association to the Australian Curling Federation. Along the way, The Rules (constituted and then updated, and other working documents) were created. The only obstacle at the time when applying for National Sporting Recognition was the ACF did not have a Member Protection Policy.

Dave and Matt Panoussi, the VCA Representative on the 2015/16 ACF Executive, collaboratively worked on the original 27-page MPP with Dave taking it to completion. Document creation is an arduous process and without their efforts, this particular document would not have been completed. The Member Protection Policy outlines legal obligations any sport is required to meet in order to prevent and address discrimination and harassment and to protect children from harm and abuse.

On the 16th March 2016, the Australian Sports Commission officially recognised the ACF as the National Sporting Organisation for Curling subject to terms and conditions set out as part of the recognition. There are many benefits to this recognition, one being the ability for State associations to apply for grant funding as most funding models require a sport to be nationally recognised. The next time you apply for or an successful with funding, you can thank Dave and Matt for their efforts on the MPP creation enabling it to be successful.

As a long-time Queensland Curling Association (QCA) member, Dave has served both as the President of the QCA at various times and as a QCA Representative on the ACF Executive board. When reviewing policies and rules Dave is a real asset to the ACF Executive Committee. He also competed in successful World Senior Curling Championships for Australia from 2009 – 2011, with the Senior Men's team winning bronze twice in that time.

The team was made up of: Hugh Millikin (skip), Jim Parker (third), Dan Joyce (Second), Steve Hewitt (Lead) and Lloyd Roberts (Alternate) with Gerald Chick as the team advisor.

Many of you will recognise most if not all of those names as they have been involved in various aspects of curling for many years and helped create a foundation for international opportunities that our Federation and its members benefit from today. There were many obstacles to overcome for this initial Challenge and all of those involved have paved the way to smoother processes and competitions.

This is the first Senior Men's Curling team who competed in February 2003 at the World Senior Curling Championships held in Winnipeg, Manitoba. The team consisted of Skip Lloyd Roberts, Vice-skip Neil Galbraith, 2nd Jim Oastler, Lead Richard Leggat.

There were 15 Senior Men's teams and 10 Senior Women's teams in Winnipeg for this event - although the first appearance by an Australian Senior Women's team was in 2013. The next Senior Men's appearance at the World's was in 2005 featuring Skip Lloyd Roberts, Vice-Skip Tom Kidd, 2nd Jim Oastler, and Lead Neil Galbraith. Australia did not have representation again until 2019. Every year since Hugh Millikin until the

Australia at the 1992 Winter Olympic Games in Albertville
Today we look back at the first Australian Men's team at the 1992 Winter Olympic Games. Over the past few days the ACF has featured some of the trailblazers in Australian Curling as part of International Men's Day on the 19th November. It seems fitting to end this celebration of Men's Curling with the first appearance at an Olympic Winter Games with the team of (L-R in Photo) Hugh Millikin (skip), Tom Kidd (third), Dan Joyce (Second), Steve Hewitt (Lead) and Brian Stuart (Alternate).

Curling was a demonstration sport at the 1992 Winter Olympics. The competition was held in the patinoire Olympique de Pralognan-la-Vanoise, near the host city, Albertville. This was the third time curling was a demonstration sport at the Winter Olympics with 1932 and 1968 being recorded officially as other years. Curling was officially added to the Olympic programme at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano. In 1992, there were 8 countries: Australia, Canada, France, Great Britain, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and United States. Switzerland won the gold medal over Norway with a 7-6 score. Australia was in Pool A with Norway, Switzerland, and Great Britain where close games were lost to Great Britain and Norway and they
