

Team Gill/Hewitt Continue Strong Season as European Tour Begins

Released 28 January 2025 – Tahli Gill and Dean Hewitt have kicked off 2025 in impressive form, securing their fourth first-place finish of the 2024/25 season at the Jamaica Cup Mixed Doubles event. Their undefeated run marked a strong start to the new year as they continue their push towards the World Championships.

Following their win, the team reached the semi-finals at the Fredericton Mixed Doubles Super Series event, finishing just short of the final, continuing their consistent season in these top tier Mixed Doubles events. Their results reinforce their position amongst the world's top three teams as they now shift their focus to training and events in Europe for the month of February.

While in Europe, Gill and Hewitt will take advantage of the Australian Institute of Sport's European Training Centre in Italy, a facility designed to provide Australian athletes with world-class resources in a high-performance environment.

With a packed schedule ahead, Gill and Hewitt remain focused on refining their game as they prepare for the World Championships in April —the final Olympic points qualification event.
